



What is an accessible website?





Sites that are designed with accessibility in mind will be compatible with disability-enabled software (like screen readers & enabled audio) and will allow those users to continue the online navigation process with reduced obstacles.






So who sets these standards and where did they originate?





WCAG is an acronym for Web Content Accessibility Guidelines - a systematic set of technical recommendations created to help a website become more accessible to people with various kinds of disabilities and build on equal access and opportunity.







There are three grade levels of website accessibility:

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- A, AA and AAA (lowest, average and highest compliance)
 - A (must support)
 - AA (should support)
 - AAA (may support)
 - A+AA= Standards of accessibility



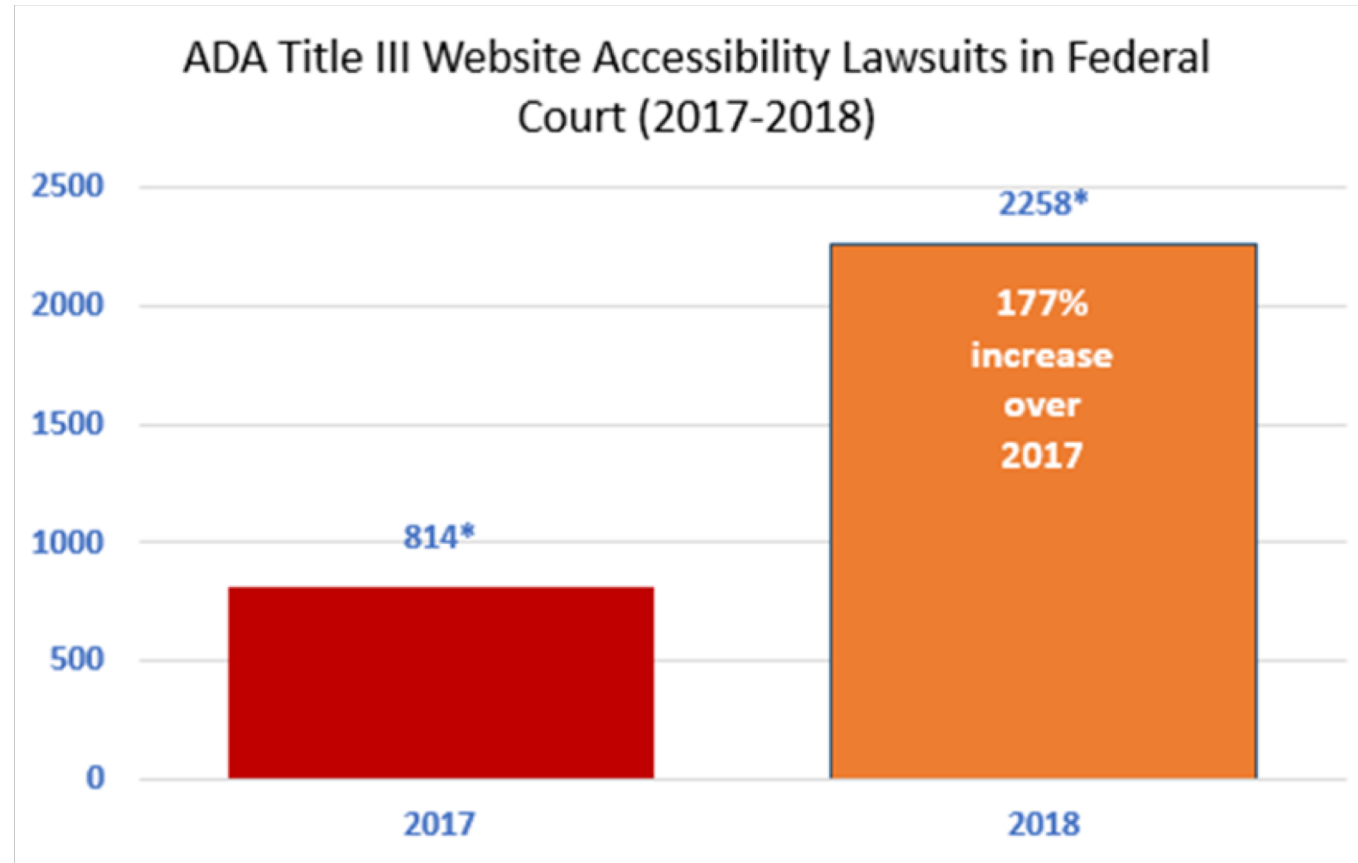


Twelve guidelines organized under four principles:

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- **Perceivable** - Information and user interface components must be presentable to users in ways they can perceive.
 - **Operable** - Interface forms, controls, and navigation are operable
 - **Understandable** - Information and the operation of user interface must be understandable
 - **Robust** - Content must be robust enough that it can be interpreted reliably by a wide variety of user agents
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


Why should employers care about an accessible career site?



*According to ADA regulations³, it is acceptable for an organization with an inaccessible website to provide an alternative method of accommodating people with disabilities, **just as long as this alternative delivers an equal level of service.***



It DOES have legal consequences:

WCAG 2.0 AA has been applied by most courts as the ADA standard even if not yet adopted by the Americans with Disabilities ACT (ADA) standard by federal agencies.

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

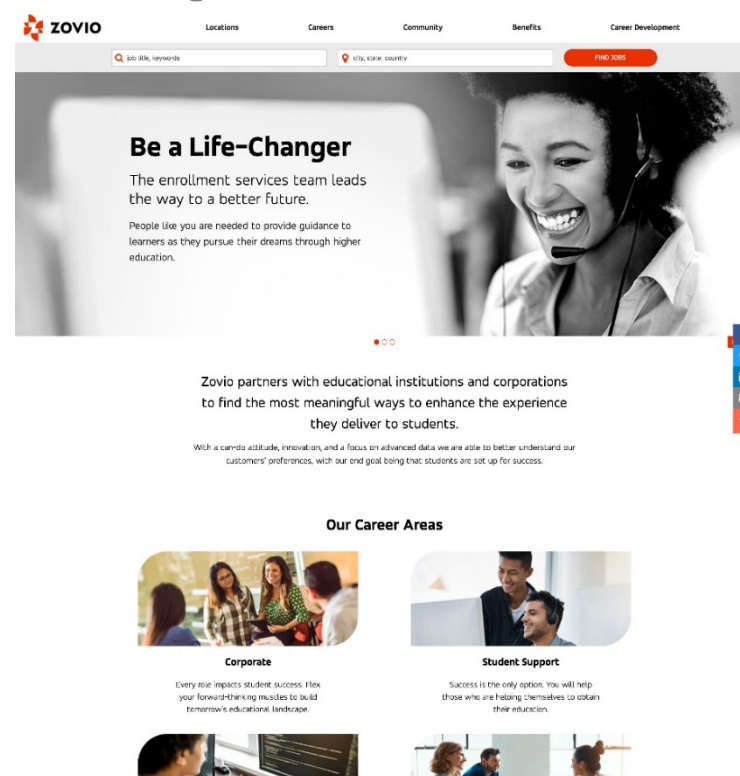
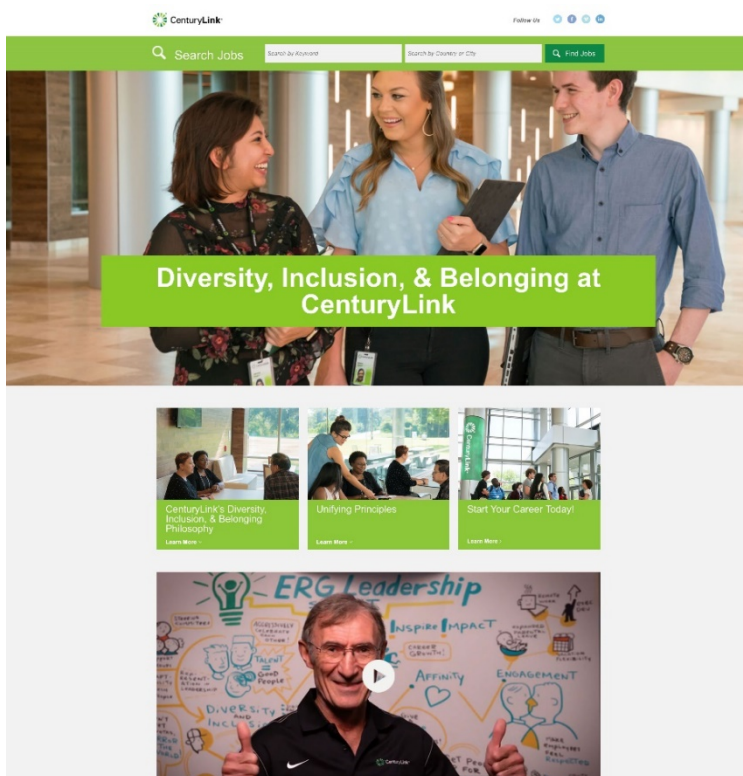
C is for **CREATE**

 - No automatic play media
 - Design your site with accessibility forefront
